The next Besterman Enlightenment Workshop of the term will be held on Monday, 23 January 2017 (Second Week), at 5 p.m., at the Voltaire Foundation (99 Banbury Road). Vittoria Feola (Università degli Studi di Padova) will be speaking about 'Prince Eugene of Savoy and the Radical Enlightenment: A Reappraisal'.

The abstract for the talk is as follows:

'Eugene of Savoy (1663-1736) has been associated to the "radical Enlightenment" through his supposed patronage of John Toland. His insistence on philological accuracy set him apart from the likes of Voltaire or Toland, thus showing Eugene's own princely ways of partaking of the early Enlightenment.'

Abstract

Central imagining clarifies how identity and identification contribute to the development of character. It can also be used to show how identity plays out in the clinical setting, by tracking transient identifications within the transference. It is thus a useful philosophical device for 'translating out' object relational shifts in the countertransference.

Central imagining is imagining being someone from that person's perspective; in everyday terms it is 'imagining someone from the inside'. The term 'central imagining' is owed to Richard Wollheim and used by him in his philosophical writing on identification. Key to it is his claim that in imagining being another person we imagine what
