#### 1.1 Modern Spanish Research Seminar

Week 6, Tuesday 23rd February 5 pm GMT, online

##### **“Between poetry and commitment. The first performances of Lorca’s theatre in Britain” María Bastianes (University of Leeds)**

Abstract: In this lecture I will explore the initial reception of Federico García Lorca on British stages, since his death at the beginning of the Spanish Civil War until the Mid-Fifties, a turning point in the evolution of theatre in the UK. This exploration of a largely ignored archive of the past opens new gates for future theoretical reflections surrounding the symbolic weight of the author and his work, but it also offers a relevant case study for understanding the role of theatre in forging national imaginaries and fostering cultural exchange between countries in the tumultuous decades of pre- and post-Second World War, a period of crisis of national/European imaginaries and realignment of global geopolitical powers that in many ways mirrors our own challenging present.

#### 1.2 Writing & Resistance: A Live Reading of the White Rose Resistance Pamphlets

Monday 22 February (Week 6), 5pm GMT, online

At around 11am on Thursday 18 February 1943 two students in Munich were arrested for distributing anti-Nazi pamphlets. By Monday they had been interrogated, tried, and executed along with another member of the resistance circle. Further arrests followed. From 15-27 February 2021 the White Rose Project will be following the events as they happened in real time through daily posts on Twitter, Facebook, and Instagram (@whiteroseoxford #whiteroserealttime). This year marks the 78th anniversary of the first White Rose trials. It’s also a year when the dates and days of the week coincide. Imagine going about your normal routine on Monday, being arrested on Thursday, being interrogated over the weekend, and going to trial the following Monday morning. At the heart of our week is a live reading of the White Rose’s resistance pamphlets, translated from German into English by student members of the [White Rose Project](#). Dr Alex Lloyd (Fellow by Special Election in German, St Edmund Hall) will give a short introduction to the pamphlets. The readers are current and former students and academics, mirroring the membership of the original group. The event will open and close with music by the award-winning vocal ensemble [SANSARA](#), recorded on 22 February 2020. This event is supported by The Oxford Research Centre in the Humanities (TORCH) and the University of Oxford’s Public Engagement with Research Seed Fund. It is part of the White Rose Project, a research and public engagement initiative bringing the story of the White Rose resistance circle to English-speaking audiences.

During this event, the Discussion Group will host David Karashima who will speak about his 2020 book *Who We're Reading When We're Reading Murakami*. The book chronicles Murakami's relationship with the translators who produced the first versions of his novels in English, as well as the editors and illustrators who collaborated to create the translated versions of his works. It comments on the power dynamic between translator and author, as well as the idiosyncrasies of Japanese-English literary translation.

Bio: David Karashima has translated a range of contemporary Japanese authors into English, including Hitomi Kanehara, Hisaki Matsuura, and Shinji Ishii. He coedited the anthology *March Was Made of Yarn: Writers Respond to the Japanese Earthquake, Tsunami, and Nuclear Meltdown* and is coeditor of Pushkin Press's Contemporary Japanese Novellas series and Stranger Press's Keshiki series. He is an Associate Professor of Creative Writing at Waseda University in Tokyo.
